At the very least, and perhaps at the very most, *defend our rights*.

Now, rights-defense is not easy; folks in government along with

folks who demand *more* government have other plans. It's easier to attack peaceful people for not doing what you want than to come to the aid of victims who are under attack — or have been conned or kidnapped — by really sick and evil people.

So every now and then it is a good idea to call attention to governments actually doing Job One.

The U.S. Marshals Service put out a press release last week, and it got some attention:

We live in a time of heightened awareness of the "trafficking" of under-age persons for prostitution and sex slavery.

"U.S. Marshals find 39 missing children in Georgia in 'Operation Not Forgotten."

This law enforcement campaign "resulted



in the rescue of 26 children, the safe location of 13 children and the arrest of nine criminal associates. Additionally, investigators cleared 26 arrest warrants and filed additional charges for alleged crimes related to sex trafficking, parental kidnapping, registered sex offender violations, drugs and weapons possession, and custodial interference."

The coverage of the operation so far has produced little beyond what's in the press release. So our job is to praise the effort and hope that the these children are cared for and can begin to heal.

We live in a time of heightened awareness of the "trafficking" of under-age persons for prostitution and sex slavery. We can thank Jeffrey Epstein for that. And the U.S. Marshals and local law enforcement for this rescue.

This is, after all, the reason we have governments in the first place.
